From Father John

Beloved in Christ:

I pray that each of us are taking the spiritual journey during this holy fasting season, together with the Righteous Joseph and the Holy Virgin Mary, which leads to the manger in Bethlehem – and that along

the way we are also reflecting on the great mystery of Jesus Christ's Nativity in the Flesh. I find it helpful during this season to read the Nativity narratives of the Gospels - my personal favorite is the account of the Holy Apostle and Evangelist Luke. St. Luke's seemingly simple descriptive narrative is replete with profound theological meaning: "And she gave birth to her first-born Son and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." (Luke 2:7)



What a wondrous mystery that Mary gave birth to the Incarnate God! The Holy Spirit overshadowed the Holy Virgin, and she conceived the One Who is inconceivable – yes, the pre-eternal God, through the flesh of Mary, became the God-Man. This glorious Birth was foretold seven hundred years earlier by the Holy Prophet Isaiah: "Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel ('God is with us')." (Isaiah 7:14) The Evangelist Luke emphasized that Jesus (which means, "God saves") was Mary's first-born Son – so that believers in every age would know that she was a virgin *before and during* His Birth. Our Holy Tradition further upholds that Mary remained a virgin *after* – throughout the remainder of her life – which is also supported in Holy Scripture, as Christ entrusted her to the Apostle and Evangelist John from the Cross, for she had no other children. (John 19:26-27)

After giving birth to the Christ-child, the Virgin Mary wrapped Him in swaddling cloths: Due to the cultural influence of popular non-Orthodox portrayals, we tend to envision the Birth of Jesus in a somewhat romantic fashion, as if the sweet little blue-eyed, blonde curly-haired baby had been wrapped in a receiving blanket in a soft bed of hay! However, our Orthodox Christian Iconography depicts the full glory and truth of this event – specifically the swaddling cloths resemble, in a prophetic way, the burial linen in which our Lord would be wrapped following His removal from the Cross. Far from the cradle of our Nativity sets, the Orthodox Icon reveals the manger as a coffin – and so the imagery of the cloths and the manger drives home the point that Jesus Christ was born in the Flesh for one reason: To die for our sins!

When we read that there was no place for Joseph and Mary at the inn, although we might have the tendency to romanticize this detail as well, St. Luke's account foretells these very words our Lord would later use during His public ministry: Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His Head." (Matthew 8:20) Christ came into the world because the world had drifted far, far away from God and, indeed, had rejected Him - just as we read in St. John's prologue, "He came to His own home, and His own people received Him not." (John 1:11) However, the hope and joy of this Holy Season is that all of us will become spiritually renewed by focusing on the real meaning of Christ's Nativity and therefore willingly receive Christ in our hearts and minds – just as the Virgin and the manger received Him, so that we all might become, by His grace, the children of God.







From Father Florin

St. Ambrose was born in 339 at Trier, son of the Pretorian Prefect of Gaul. There is a legend that, as a small child, a swarm of bees landed on his face as he lay in his cradle and left behind a drop of honey. His father took this as a sign of St. Ambrose's future eloquence and honeyed tongue. He studied Greek literature, law, and rhetoric. In 372, he was made the consular prefect of Liguria and Aemilia with headquarters in Milan, the second capital of Italy. St. Ambrose soon made a name for himself as an excellent administrator.

At this time in the Church, there were deep divisions between the Arians, who denied the divinity of Christ, and those who affirmed it. In 374, Auxentius, the Arian Bishop of Milan, died, and the Arians wanted one of their own as successor. St. Ambrose went personally to the cathedral, where the election would be held, to prevent a riot. During his speech, a voice which many claimed was that of a small child cried out: "Ambrose for bishop!" To his embarrassment, since he was not yet a Christian, the whole assembly took up the cry. In vain did he assert his ineligibility for the office. Yet,



within one week he was Baptized and ordained Bishop. Under the guidance of his tutor, Simplician, St. Ambrose began the study of the Scriptures and the writings of Origen and Basil. He would become an influential promoter of their thought in the Western church. As bishop, he immediately adopted an ascetic lifestyle, distributed his money to the poor, gave away all his land, only making provision for his sister and entrusting his family to his brother.

He also encouraged monasticism and recommended the Theotokos as a patron and model for religious sisters. His influence on the conversion of Augustine in 386 is well known. St. Ambrose is said to have quickly brought Arianism to an end in Milan. For this, he used his knowledge of Greek (then rare in the West) to access Eastern theological writers and used this knowledge in his preaching. His speaking ability greatly impressed Augustine.

As Milan was the administrative capital of the Empire in the West, he played an important role in the political issues of the day, giving both advice and admonitions to various rulers. In 377, he wrote "On the Faith," for the young emperor Gratian to warn him against the Arian heresy, of which his Uncle Valens was protector. When Gratian was murdered, St. Ambrose persuaded the new Emperor, Maximus, to be satisfied with a part of the empire and leave the rest for Valentinian II. He also managed to prevent the restoration of the cult of the goddess of Victory. He refused to allow a Church in Milan to be used by Arians in the court and was once put under siege with his people in another Church for the same reason.


He reminded Valentinian that the Emperor was in the Church and not above or outside it. Soon afterwards, Valentinian fled for protection to Theodosius, the Emperor of the East, who had defeated and killed Maximus, and in effect became the ruler of the West as well. Despite his enormous power, St. Ambrose did not hesitate in threatening Theodosius with excommunication following a notorious massacre in Thessalonica, in 390, when an estimated 7,000 men, women and children were slaughtered in reprisal for the killing of the Roman Governor by rioters. St. Ambrose told Theodosius to imitate David in his repentance as he had imitated him in guilt. The Emperor was readmitted to the Eucharist only after several months of penance.

St. Ambrose reposed in 397, at the age of 58, and we commemorate him in the Orthodox Church *on December 7.* He was succeeded as bishop of Milan by Simplician. St. Ambrose's body may still be seen in the Church of Sant'Ambrogio in Milan, where it has been continuously venerated.

There is an interesting story in Augustine's Confessions about St. Ambrose: "When [St. Ambrose] read, his eyes scanned the page and his heart sought out the meaning, but his voice was silent, and his tongue was still. Anyone could approach him freely and guests were not commonly announced, so that often, when we came to visit him, we found him reading like this in silence, for he never read aloud."

The striking point of this passage is that St. Ambrose could read silently, implying that hardly anyone else could do so at the time. It was felt that anything that was well written was intended to be read aloud in the ancient world. St. Ambrose had thus the habit of doing so.

Bishop Ambrose was and continues to be a genuine witness of the Lord. Let us thus conclude with the Bishop's most famous words, full of love for our Lord Jesus Christ: "To us Christ is all! If you have a wound to heal, He is the doctor; if you are parched by fever, He is the spring; if you are oppressed by injustice, He is justice; if you are in need

of help, He is strength; if you fear death, He is life; if you desire Heaven, He is the way; if you are in the darkness, He is light . . . Taste and see how good the Lord is: Blessed is the man who hopes in Him!"

Let us also put our hope in Jesus Christ, our Lord! Amen.

Building and Maintenance

For those of you who were unable to attend the General Assembly meeting, we would like to update you on the Building Committee's plans moving forward. As many of you have seen in the Festival Final Report, it is evident that our community must find additional or alternative revenue sources to not only cover our overhead costs, but also to enable us to come together to celebrate important events.

The original intent of the Festival was that its proceeds would fund maintenance and new projects for the community. However, over the last decade and a half, these funds have predominantly been used to cover primary expenses like utilities and salaries. Having been raised in this community all my life, I fondly recall the many New Year's parties, Christmas pageants, Greek School programs, and dinner dances hosted by various ministries such as AHEPA, the Pan Arcadians, and the Pan Cretan groups. We need to return to those days when we gathered not just to work at the Festival, but to enjoy each other's company, have fun, and create lasting memories.

Over the next few months, our plan is to move forward with two major projects: Painting and stuccoing the Hall building, as well as replacing the floors in Panos Hall. We will also address some of the damage to the interior lower walls and columns through repainting. These two projects are estimated to cost approximately \$200,000. Thanks to the generous donation of \$100,000 from Angelo Stamis and Family, we have already raised \$145,000. Once the renovations are completed, we aim to reinstate the Catering and Event Committee to begin renting out the Hall, which will provide crucial revenue to help cover ongoing expenses. More importantly, it will help us host a variety of community events, which will be vital for maintaining everyone's connection to our Church. After the Hall renovations are completed, we are also planning to complete the remaining Iconography. The Iconographer who has worked on the previous renderings recently traveled to the US for another project, and we met with her to finalize the remaining Iconography for the Church.

None of this would be possible without your continued generosity. Your donations, both large and small, make all the difference. We appreciate your ongoing support as we work to complete these much-needed projects. Please do not hesitate to reach out if you have any questions or thoughts to share. Greek Food Festival Recap

Reflection on Greek Food Festival Sustainability

The 2024 Greek Food Festival brought to light several ongoing challenges that impact both attendance and profitability. Factors beyond our control, such as extreme weather, economic fluctuations, competing local events, and unexpected liabilities like equipment failures, significantly affect our success. These variables underscore the unpredictability of the festival's financial performance.

However, a deeper and more pressing issue has emerged: the aging of our core volunteer base. For decades, dedicated community members have played a vital role in chairing booths, preparing traditional foods, and passing down beloved recipes. Their tireless efforts have been the backbone of the festival.

Yet, we are now facing a reality where fewer new volunteers are stepping up to fill these essential roles, threatening the festival's long-term sustainability. Given these challenges, <u>it</u> is increasingly evident that relying solely on the Greek Food Festival as our primary revenue source may not be viable for the future. To secure the longevity of both the festival and our broader community activities, we must explore additional revenue streams. Here are several potential strategies:

Year-Round Cultural Experiences: Hosting smaller, regular cultural events like cooking classes, wine tastings, and music nights could engage a broader audience while providing ongoing revenue. WE NEED TO RE-ESTABLISH THE C&E COMMITTEE

Community Partnerships: Partnering with local businesses or organizations to co-sponsor events or share resources could alleviate financial and volunteer pressures while growing our reach.

Grants & Donations: Actively seeking grants aimed at cultural preservation or community engagement could provide financial support.

Attracting Younger Involvement: Investing in targeted outreach and mentorship programs could encourage younger members to step up, learn the recipes, and eventually lead the booths and festival operations

While the Greek Food Festival remains a beloved tradition that celebrates our heritage, these challenges emphasize the need to innovate and adapt. we can ensure that the festival not only survives but thrives for future generations. The time to act is now. Re-establishing a proactive approach through a revitalized Cultural & Events Committee and engaging the wider community in our mission are crucial steps forward. We must embrace these changes to preserve our traditions and support our community's goals, creating a lasting impact that extends well beyond the annual festival.

Sponsorship & Souvenir Sales:

- Sponsorships: \$61,000
- Souvenir Sales: Netted \$80,000, including \$21,225 from donations aimed at underwriting, in addition to sponsorships.
- **Key Savings**: Reducing contract costs by \$150,000 was instrumental in securing a strong financial outcome despite a significantly lower turnout.

- A significant drop in attendance with 8,228 fewer visitors compared to 2023.
- Challenges included excessive heat and economic factors, impacting overall turnout and revenue.

- Valet Reimbursement: \$650 (for keys taken by valet service).
- **Sellable Inventory**: \$35,000 (includes pita, fries, gyro meat, wine, and spirits, but excludes pastries and specialty items).
- Glaziers Alcohol Credit: \$600.
- Potential United Rentals Claim: The festival is pursuing reimbursement of \$70,000 \$100,000 for faulty equipment (generator failure) and lost revenue during Friday night's outage.




Notes:


